The Event

The annual *Australia v Rest-Of-The-World challenge* was introduced to our social bowling calendar by Mike Porter in 2011.

The challenge takes place each year on the hiatus in the metropolitan pennant program for the Men's Country Carnival.

Originally the challenge was run as a fours event. From 2016 onwards it has been run as a triples event.

Participants have included some players from neighbouring clubs and in 2017 was broadened to become an open event, welcoming our women bowlers to the challenge.

A feature of the challenge is that all teams are randomly drawn from the members of each squad, with some pennant skippers often taking up lead or second roles on the day.

Each team plays two games against different opponents and the aggregate score for all teams from each side determines the result.

An excellent turn-out of 88 keen competitors braved the near-perfect conditions on 4 February to contest the perpetual Tranmere Trophy. Constructed from an offcut of the old bar, covered with a sample of the new synthetic bowling green, featuring a replica bowl and the flags of the countries of birth of our members, this prestigious trophy was hoisted aloft by team captain, John Feddersen. Thanks to Tom Lycett for making and donating the trophy.

The Australian team won 10 games, drew 3 and lost 9. The result, however, is not determined on games won. It is determined on aggregate shots won and, on that count, the Rest-of-the-World triumphed 205 to 187. Only one of the Australian teams won both games. Geoff Elverd, Tim Huston, Gerry Carr and John Bartram took home the six-packs. Two teams from the Rest-of-the-World won both games, with Bill Reid, Paul Maslin, Des Paley and Bill Dunn winning the six-packs on count back from Claus Schonfeldt, Peter Damiani, Bob Cubbin and Alex Czornohalan.

The annual challenge of Tranmere members born in Australia v members born overseas has now been going for six years. The Australians hadn't won in the first five and this year, played on Wednesday 3 February, proved to be no different.

76 bowlers contested the perpetual Lycett-Porter Trophy. The Rest-of-the-World team won 14 games, drew 2 and lost 10, to triumph with an overall shot difference of 286 to 276. That compares with last year's win of 205 to 187. The Australians are getting closer. Will 2017 be the year?

Four of the Australian teams won both games, with John Dean, Trevor Morris and Justin Parkinson being the best amongst them, winning by a staggering 30 shots and, in the process, being the only team on the day to earn a six-badge. Five

of the Rest-of-the-World teams won both games, with Claus Schonfeldt, Tom Lycett and Mike Porter being equal best of those with an 18 shot difference and winning on count-back from Günther Grapentin, Nick Cirocco and Graham Young.

At the declaration of results, the Australians got all excited when Mike Porter called their name first after the drum roll. That, however, was a case of premature jubilation as Mike went on to reveal their score, followed by the superior score for the Rest-of-the-World. Once more the trophy was hoisted aloft by the team captains for the Rest-of-the-World, who for 2016 were Günther Grapentin and Karl Stuelten.

2017

In past years, the annual Australia v Rest-of-the-World event has been held in early January to coincide with the hiatus in the men's Wednesday pennant competition due to the men's country carnival. This year, it was postponed because of the extreme heat on that day and instead was held at the end of the pennant season.

The event was also broadened out to include both men and women and an excellent turn-out of 64 members competed for the trophy and bragging rights. Bolstered by the women in its side, the Australians pushed the Rest-of-the-World to its limits and looked a chance to win the trophy for the first time in its seven-year history, only to fall agonisingly short once more. The Rest-of-the-World won by four shots, 246 to 242, the second closest margin since the two-shot win in the inaugural year.

"Are all your good shirts in the wash?" David Brooks cheekily asked John Feddersen, who was proudly wearing his German National Football team shirt for the annual Australia v Rest-of-the-World challenge match on Wednesday 7 February.

It was another sweltering day – as it seems to be every year for this challenge event – so, a turn-out of 68 of our 95 regular Wednesday men pennant bowlers, plus two recruits for a total of 70, was excellent. Now in its eighth year, the Australian contingent fielded its best-ever squad in a determined effort to break its run of never having won the challenge. To bolster its chances, the Australians recalled Justin Parkinson from Holdfast Bay for the day. Peter Parman joined the Rest-of-the World squad.

Not only was the weather hot, so too was the competition to determine which side would take home the perpetual Lycett-Porter trophy. For the record, the Australians had three two-game winning teams and won 11 of the 24 games. The Rest-of-the-World had five two-game winning teams and won 13 games. The challenge, however, is not decided on games won, nor on ends own. It is decided on shots won and, in a dramatic finish to the day, the adjudicators had to convene an inquiry into the match cards for one of the games before declaring the challenge a draw on 258 shots each.



The omens were with the Australians to finally bowl their way to a maiden victory in this, the ninth year of the annual challenge. Having fallen short in the first eight challenges since the inaugural year in 2011, they had nevertheless consistently narrowed the margin from 18 shots in 2015, to 10 in 2016, 4 in 2017 and a draw last year. On that trajectory, the Australians were set for a narrow victory this year.

News spread fast that the Australians were gathering their best-ever squad. Not to be outmuscled, the Rest-of-the-World responded appropriately. On the day, 80 players, the second highest turnout of bowlers in the history of the event, participating on 21 February.

The Australians got out of the blocks smartly and were determined never to look back., They went from strength to strength, eventually running out winners by 35 shots (283 to 248). The omens were right but, the victory was not as narrow as the trajectory had suggested. It was emphatic, with the winning margin being the biggest in the nine years of the challenge.

The best of the Rest-of-the-World was Terry Brooker, Rod Fraser and Frank Dalkos. The best of the Australian teams was Bob Cecchi, Rod Squire and Des Butler,

Now in its tenth year, the annual Australia v-Rest-of-the-World Challenge this year attracted 72 participants. In near perfect playing conditions, the Australian squad opened a handy lead of 144 to 128 shots after the opening game. The Rest-of-the-World rallied to draw the second game on 126 shots apiece; not enough to overcome the first game deficit, but enough to salvage some pride. The Australia squad retained the perpetual trophy made and donated by Tom Lycett back in 2015.

The prestigious trophy was hoisted aloft by team captain, Bob Cecchi, who together with Mike Porter did another outstanding job in organising the event.

Australia has now won the last two challenges after the Rest-of-the-World won the first seven and a draw was played out in 2018.

Only four teams won both games - two for the Australians and two for the Rest-of-the-World. The best of those was Rod Fraser, Denise Abraham, and Graham Young (+24 shots) for the Rest-of-the-World, with Bob Osborne, Trevor Freeman, and Adrian Beare (+10 shots) best of the Australians.

Fifty-eight players – forty-six men and twelve women, came together on 31 January 2024 to contest the annual Australia v Rest-of-the-World challenge. This number included two visitors – Rob Christiansen (Club Holdfast), a friend of Greg Lawson and a cousin to our own Bob Christiansen, and Fred Godley (Prospect Broadview), husband of Chris Godley and a virtual Tranmere member now for many years.

With twenty-nine players per side there were nine triples and one pair playing head-to-head in each of two games. The pairs, and consequently one triples team, were changed after the first game. At the half-way mark the Australian Team had established an aggregate 13 shot lead. Edna Bradley, team captain for the Rest-of-the-World implored her players to 'pull your fingers out' in the second game if they were to get back into the contest.

Well, not only did they get back into it, they ran away with it, winning by 21 shots – 211 to 190. What a turn around. The best team for the Australians was Bob Gilby, Leigh Hall and Pam Fullarton, who despite losing the first game by 5 shots, won their second by 19 shots for an aggregate 14 shot win. Now in its fifteenth year, the popular Australia v Rest-of-the-World skirmish during the hiatus in the metropolitan pennant program for the Men's Country Carnival, had 66 players respond to the call to arms on 5 February 2025. The weather was kind with a brief lapse in the heatwave conditions prior to and anticipated to re-emerge after the event.

Ken Warmington (Australia) and Ivor Mowat (Rest-of-the-World) succeeded Pam Fullarton and Edna Bradley as side captains after Pam and Edna's sterling performance over the previous two years.

Before the main event, Rocky Cirocco was introduced as a new, mid-season member. The Cirocco name is already well known to Tranmere members. Rocky adds another, with an intriguing twist. Rocky and Nick (OAM), while not directly related, became brothers-in-law when they married sisters. The sisters thus had the same maiden name and then the same married name – not something you come across very often.

The prestigious Lycett-Porter Trophy is won by the side with the most aggregate shots after two rounds of twelve end triples games. The Aussies – oi, oi, oi – got away to a great start in the first round, winning seven of the eleven games, drawing another and losing only three. At the break they were ahead by 22 shots.

The spectre of last year loomed large in the minds of the Aussie contingent. The Rest-of-the-World remained hopeful. Did lightning strike twice? It sure did. In yet another remarkable turn-around of fortunes, the Rest-of-the-World won seven of the eleven games in the second round, drawing two and losing only two. The Rest-of-the-World won the trophy by 8 shots – 247 to 239.

Ken Warmington graciously presented the trophy to Ivor Mowat and, in doing so, noted that the Rest-of-the-World required a few Aussie players to even up the side numbers.
